Tree Tops - President's Message by Fred Mingo, HOA Board President

February 2024

Happy New Year! I hope everyone is enjoying this winter and the gorgeous days we have had with snow on the ground and the trees; truly a beautiful sight. We just held our first in-person Annual Meeting since before the pandemic and completed our election cycle so within this quarterly edition of our Readwood, we will highlight our 2023 accomplishments, introduce our board members, and look forward to 2024.

First, I want to send out a hearty THANK YOU to three outstanding community representatives that are stepping down from elected Board positions after almost 40 years of collective service. Linde Fuller served on the Board and as our Readwood editor for almost 20 years, Pam Weld served on the Board for over 14 years and Bill Golumbfskie finished up his first 3 year term. Together, their efforts have greatly improved our community and helped make DuFief a better place to live, especially during these past post-pandemic years. On behalf of our DuFief community, Well Done!

2020 in Review

- 1. AppFolio transition: This is our most ambitious project of the year. We have fully transitioned our community into the AppFolio software system for all homeowners. Currently we have 85% of our homeowners using the system, receiving regular communications for upcoming events and information like this Readwood and much more. Our Architecture Review Committee (ARC) process is completely digitized and streamlined and, thanks to another project, we have digitized all of our 50+ years of historical paper files. These records are now accessible through your individual Appfolio homeowner portal and/or the members only section of our community website. Please reach out to board@dufief.org with any questions.
- 2. Community Survey: After several attempts, we completed a community wide survey of priorities and interests using the Survey Monkey tool. We are using these results to prioritize our HOA Board activities moving forward. Please click on the link in this Readwood or log into our members only section to review the results.
- 3. In Person social events: As a result of your survey results, we received positive support for organizing community events and activities. I personally believe this area is important, especially after we suspended these events during the pandemic. This is one of the reasons we elected to hold our Annual Board meeting in person with a pot-luck dinner before the meeting. We also hosted a welcoming committee event and two picnics at the pond. We look forward to hosting more events in 2024.
- 4. Common Area Improvements: Another area of importance highlighted in the survey was improving our many common ground areas. In addition to completing several pond area projects, like replacing worn pond playset parts and adding new mulch around the playset, we effectively leveraged the Montgomery County 311 system to repair and replace damaged cul-de-sac curbs. In addition, we started a front entrance beautification project around the stone retaining walls where the HOA has easement responsibilities. This specific front entrance effort was the catalyst for the formation of a new DuFief Green Team that will be introduced in this Readwood. I'm personally excited about how this effort will blossom and will be taking on additional community improvements over the coming years!

2024 looking ahead:

- 1. AppFolio system use and adoption: My professional background was in supporting, leading and managing large technology modernization projects so I have found our transitioning to our new AppFolio system to be very similar. Our new AppFolio system offers tremendous capabilities and benefits for communicating and supporting our community including text communications and an automated community directory data collection feature. We look forward to encouraging greater user adoption and turning on more of these features this next year.
- 2. DuFief Green Team: Our newly formed DuFief Green Team is taking on several projects and looking for support from across our community.
- a. Front Entrance Beautification: Last year we cleaned up the overgrowth, dug out stumps and put down mulch to essentially reclaim the area around the stone walls at our entrance. For 2024, we have hired a consultant to assist us in planning and then planting a sustainable green space at our entrance. This project will evolve over the coming years and will definitely facilitate community participation and support. Our new board member, Moira Davenport, is leading our Green Team. Please look for their articles in the Readwood for additional
- b. Landscaping contract renewal. In 2021, we competitively awarded a contract with PPR for our HOA landscaping maintenance and services. Our contract option years were exercised last year and our current contract ends in the spring of 2025. In 2024 our Green Team will lead our effort to issue a request for proposals of this contract to ensure we receive the best services and price.
- 3. Social events: As highlighted by the survey results, our community residents prefer in-person social events. To that end, we have increased our budget and plan on hosting at least two, if not more social events in 2024. We do have a repeatable template for these events but they require VOLUNTEERS to make any plan a reality. Please reach out to board@dufief.org if you are interested in helping and or possibly taking the lead in planning a social event for our community.
- 4. Caring Neighbors: At any point in our life, we might require some form of support or assistance from a friend and or neighbor. From running to the grocery store, lifting or moving heavy objects around within their home or maybe shoveling the snow and ice from the front steps. Regardless, if you have lived in DuFief for a long time or recently moved into your home with a young family, the reality is that many of us live in DuFief but don't know our neighbors or don't know them well enough to ask for help. While Montgomery County offers a multitude of support and services, many of us recognize the decision to reach out for help can be very personal and private. In addition, many people are often unsure where they can go for support. As an effort to help within our DuFief community we are organizing a phone tree with volunteers ready to assist. This effort will be led by Pam Weld and Sandi Shapiro. 5. Committee Volunteers: DuFief is a Volunteer Board and we are always looking for VOLUNTEERS interested in helping our community. The following areas / committees in particular are in need of help. Please reach out to board@dufief.org if you are
- interested in supporting any of the following:
- a. Architectural Review Committee (ARC). According to Montgomery County Common Ownership Community (CCOC) requirement, we are required to hold an open meeting to formally approve all requests. Our ARC committee meets monthly on the first Sunday of the month to review all applications.
- i. Our survey responses highlighted the importance and interest with the ARC and there is a lot of work to be done to take our ARC and community to the next level.
- ii. We have digitized all ARC records and completely automated the ARC request processing thru AppFolio. Reconciling these digitized ARC records with the actual physical appearance of every home within our community will take some effort. Exactly how we approach this effort is under discussion. It will take time to plan out and then complete.
- b. Welcoming Committee: Welcoming new individuals and families to our neighborhood is an important step in building a community. Our Welcoming Committee is looking for volunteers interested in helping our new residents

complete this transition.

c. **Nominating Committee:** We have nine (9) elected board representatives, three are elected each year for a three-year term. The Nominating Committee is responsible for identifying prospective candidates willing to become a board member. Elections occur annually at our February Annual Board meeting. The committee serves all year and provides input for this election.

When I ran for my second term as a board in 2022, I identified four goals:

- 1) To listen to you, our community homeowners, understand your priorities and then work to deliver upon these priorities.
- 2) To improve communications between the Board and community.
- 3) To operate as a Board member, with open transparency and deliver cost effective services for our community.
- 4) To increase or maintain your home's value.

I've included my goals now, so you know my priorities and what I hope to achieve as your representative. More importantly, please feel free to let me know how I'm doing as your representative, and collectively, how we are doing as your Board representatives. Board Member Reports

Treasurer's Report on Annual Assessments

As of February 22, 2024, the Board has collected annual dues from 225 of the 306 homes in our neighborhood (roughly 73.5%). The annual assessments that we use to maintain our common areas in order to keep the DuFief neighborhood a popular area for homebuyers **ARE NOT OPTIONAL**. Every household must pay the annual dues. The original notice for 2024 dues was sent to all homeowners at the beginning of January 2024. Additional copies of the invoices have been mailed and emailed to homeowners.

The annual assessments are used primarily to maintain our common areas in order to keep the DuFief neighborhood a popular area for homebuyers. Every household must pay the annual dues.

Any homes that have not paid their dues are subject to potential lawsuit which will include a request for interest and attorneys fees and may result in a lien on your property.

We have been very successful in collecting dues. All assessments have been collected for 2010 and all years prior. There is one home that has not paid dues from 2011 through 2019; two (2) homes that have not paid 2020 dues; three (3) homes that have not paid 2021; four (4) homes that have not paid 2022 dues; and eight (8) homes that have not paid 2023 dues.

The Board does not enjoy having to take neighbors to court, however, the homeowners assessments are no different than having to pay real estate taxes on your property. If you owe more than two years of dues, a lawsuit is likely to be filed.

For those who have paid your annual assessments in a timely manner, "THANK YOU". For those who have not paid the 2024 or owe for prior years, please do so as soon as possible in order to avoid additional costs, and a potential lawsuit.

DuFief Green Team Established

When DuFief homeowners were asked in the HOA's recent survey what we saw as the most important priorities for the community, our top answer was the importance of enhancing the appearance of the common areas and, especially, the beauty of the community entrance on DuFief Drive. This result should surprise no one, because it shows the strong continuity that today's residents have with DuFief 50+ year history as a neighborhood dedicated to enjoying and preserving the natural world. Our wooded lots, our beautiful park and pond off Coles Chance Drive, and our location adjoining Muddy Branch Park (almost 900 acres of Eastern woodland forest) all contribute to our community's strong links with our natural environment.

To strengthen this focus on our links to nature, the HOA Board has encouraged the creation of the DuFief Green Team, which will take on projects to beautify DuFief as well as to provide opportunities for residents to learn about and enjoy nature, the Muddy Branch watershed, native plants and wildlife, and ways to support nature through more sustainable practices at home and in the community.

Green Teams initially sprouted as environmental advisors to municipalities but have blossomed into diverse, action-oriented groups. They're no longer confined to town halls, but rather, they're branching out into neighborhoods like ours. Here, they're not just about recycling—they're about weaving threads of sustainability into the very fabric of our community.

Statewide, over 85 Green Teams, like those championed by Sustainable Maryland, are cultivating cleaner, greener worlds. These citizen-powered movements boast stats that speak volumes: a 15% reduction in energy use in participating towns, 10% more residents composting, and a surge in community gardens and tree plantings. These aren't just numbers; they're stories of neighbors becoming stewards, families learning together, and our shared environment flourishing.

So, how can a Green Team take root in DuFief? The inspiration for this initiative comes from many sources, but one important one is the work of Doug Tallamy, an entomologist, ecologist, and conservationist who is a professor at the University of Delaware. He has written several books, such as *Bringing Nature Home: How Native Plants Sustain Wildlife in Our Gardens* and *Nature's Best Hope: A New Approach to Conservation that Starts in Your Yard*, that explain the importance of native plants and their role in the ecosystem. He advocates for home gardens and landscaping that bridge the gaps between parks and preserves in providing habitat for native species. He also calls for reimagining our lawns to expand more natural areas that can support more life.

The Board has requested that the Green Team's first project be the replanting of the walled beds at the entrance to DuFief at Route 28 and Dufief Drive with a range of Maryland native plants and shrubs. Native plants are those that have evolved in our region and are adapted to our climate, soil, and wildlife. They provide many benefits for our ecosystem, such as:

- Supporting pollinators, birds, and other animals that depend on native plants for food and shelter.
- Reducing water use, fertilizer use, and pesticide use, as native plants are more drought-tolerant, pest-resistant, and nutrient-efficient than non-native plants.
- Enhancing the natural beauty and diversity of our landscape, as native plants offer a variety of colors, shapes, and textures throughout the seasons.

We believe that by following Tallamy's vision, we can create a more natural and sustainable environment in our community that will benefit not only ourselves, but also wildlife and the planet. Imagine a vibrant group of residents, passionate about green spaces and eco-friendly living. This team, representing our diverse walks of

life, could tackle projects like revamping our common areas with native plants, organizing workshops on composting or on invasive plants, or advocating for solar panels on community buildings. The possibilities are as endless as our collective imagination.

We invite you to join us in this endeavor and become a member of the DuFief Green Team. As a member, you will have the opportunity to:

- Help decide what projects are most important and feasible for our community, such as planting native trees, shrubs, flowers, grasses, and groundcovers in our common areas, learning how to reduce the use of pesticides and herbicides, creating rain gardens or bird habitats to attract pollinators, removing invasive plants that threaten our native flora and fauna, or conducting nature and birding walks on our trails.
- Collaborate with other members and experts to plan, design, implement, and maintain these projects, using the best practices and resources available.
- Learn more about native plants and their benefits, as well as how to identify, grow, and care for them in your own yard.

Enjoy the satisfaction of making a positive difference in our community and our environment, as well as having fun and making new friends along the way.

We Want You to Know About

The MONTGOMERY COUNTY COMMISSION ON COMMON OWNERSHIP COMMUNITIES

Montgomery County recognizes that a substantial proportion of all its citizens now live in condominium and homeowner associations, and in housing cooperatives, generally called "common ownership communities." In order to better serve the special needs of these communities, to act as their advocate, and to maintain and improve the quality of life in these communities, the County created the Commission on Common Ownership Communities. The Commission operates under the authority of Chapter 10B of the County Code.

The Commission has 3 basic duties:

Education: The Commission provides free information to both members and to governing bod- ies about their rights and duties under Maryland law, as well as advice on how to properly operate the association and to avoid complaints. Among other tools, it offers a "Manual and Resource Guide" for boards of directors, and detailed information on architectural control, assessments, and meetings. It publishes a newsletter summarizing recent developments affecting common ownership communities. Commissioners will also speak to communities and their boards on request and welcome invitations to do so.

Legislation: The Commission advocates for common ownership communities concerning pro- posed laws and regulations at the local and State level.

Dispute Resolution: The Commission can hear and resolve certain disputes between members of the communities and their governing bodies, and its decisions are legally binding on the parties. Copies and easy-to-read summaries of its decisions are posted on its website and reviewed in its news- letter.

The Commission is composed of 15 volunteers who are appointed for 3-year terms. Eight members must be residents of common ownership communities and the other seven must be profes- sionals who work with the communities, such as property managers, lawyers, developers and realtors. Every Fall, the County publishes a request for applicants to the Commission to replace those whose terms are due to expire.
